Sir,

- 1. Under the powers vested in the Governor by Sec. 3(i) of the Census Ordinance I was appointed on 12 September 1970 to be Commissioner to take the Census for Gibraltar as specified in the Census Order.
- 2. The order required that the Census should be taken in respect of all persons present in Gibraltar on the night of 6 October 1970, other than serving members of HM Naval, Military and Air Services. Special returns were to be submitted for wives and families of serving members.
- 3. The arrangements were made in pursuance of this Order and the Census was taken on the appointed date. The results are contained in this Report which I have the honour to submit in accordance with Section 5 of the Census Ordinance.
- 4. I would like to record my appreciation of the assistance given by a number of Government officers and Captain P. A. R. Prior, R.A. in planning and organising the Census, and of the conscientious and efficient manner in which the enumerators and coders carried out their duties. In particular I wish to express my gratitude to my two census officers, Mrs. S. M. Fell and Mr. A. Rooke who, because of their excellent and hard work, were so much responsible for the successful carrying out of the census.
- 5. Finally I wish to place on record the high degree of co-operation given by householders in completing the census schedule.

1. Historical

In 1704, when the British took Gibraltar, it was estimated that the Spanish population was between 4,000 and 6,000. After the Spaniards left Gibraltar it seems probable that the civilian population which remained behind was small. This is borne out by old records which indicate that, in 1721, seventeen years after the British occupation, the number of civilians able to bear arms was:- English 45, Spaniards 96, Genoese 169, a total of 310. By 1753 the civilian population had grown to 1,816, consisting of British 434, Genoese 597, Jews 575, Spaniards 185, and Portuguese 25. The population then rose to nearly 3,400 by 1767, but fell to 2,900 in 1791. Between 1791 and the next recorded figure in the year 1814 the population increased substantially and reached 10,100. The rise continued, although at a slower rate, but nevertheless by the year 1871 was almost 18,700. Concern of the authorities was reflected in the Order-in-Council dated 30 August 1873, the object of which was "to make better provision to prevent the entry into and residence in Gibraltar of unauthorised persons not being British subjects, and to prevent the further increase of the over-crowded condition of Gibraltar". It is of interest that no significant increase took place during the next sixty years.

A count was taken in 1878 and at ten yearly intervals from 1881 to 1931. The population reached a high figure of about 20,400 in 1901 but declined to 17,400 in 1931. No count was made in 1941, since the war necessitated the evacuation of about 16,700 civilian population, including all women and children. Their repatriation, which began in April 1944, was not completed until early 1951. In this period 15,700 persons returned from the United Kingdom, Madeira, Jamaica and Tangiers. It is said that approximately 2,000 persons did not return but settled down in Britain. The census of 1951 recorded 20,845 persons, which was only slightly exceeded by the census of 1961 with a figure of 21,636.

Appendix I shows the census results of a century ago when the main employment shown in the census was "Servants etc."; other employments included 49 Goatherds, 159 Merchants, 81 Landed Proprietors, and Dealers in Porter.

2. 1970 Census Planning and Organisation

On 4 September 1970 an Order of the Governor in Council was issued under Section 2 of the Census Ordinance requiring a census to be undertaken in respect of all persons present in Gibraltar - with the exception of serving members of H.M. Naval, Military and Air Services and their wives and families on the night of Tuesday 6 October 1970. Special returns were however submitted to the Census Commissioner by the Services, an abridged return was accepted for visitors on holidays and short business trips, and numbers only were required for persons in transit.

Gibraltar was divided initially into 75 enumeration areas and an enumerator appointed for each. Each enumerator was given a map of his area - in most cases an enlargement of the area as shown on the new 1:2500 scale map of Gibraltar - and the details of the area were discussed personally with him. A number of these areas were found to contain only a small population, and the enumerators in these areas were allocated to help in areas with a very large population. The total number of enumeration areas was thus reduced to 64, and the population of these areas together with the numbers for institutions are give in Table 8.

The enumerators were appointed by special selection from government officers and signed a statement of secrecy. Each enumerator was provided with a copy of "Instructions to Enumerators" explaining his duties and responsibilities and the manner in which his duties had to be carried out. (A copy of these instructions is included at Appendix II and are a guide to some of the definitions used in the census). In addition meetings were held to explain, and discuss in detail, the many questions on the census schedule and to enable the enumerators to raise queries or difficulties. These meetings proved to be invaluable.

Towards the end of September an explanatory notice about the census, see Appendix III, was sent by post to all householders and, later, publicity was given through the press and Gibraltar Television and Radio. The census forms, see Appendix IV, were delivered by the enumerators before the census date and an explanation of how to complete the forms was then given on television. The Director of Education also arranged for the older children in senior schools to be instructed in how to fill in the forms and so help their parents and friends.

The collection of the completed forms began on 7 October and about 80 per cent had been returned to the census office by 10 October. Many householders were out when the enumerator called necessitating several call-backs; and the collection was not completed until 17 October. The determination of the enumerators to collect every form, if humanly possible, has, without doubt, ensured a reliable count with few omissions.

The editing of the information on the census schedules and the coding of the data began on 19 October and was completed in just over one month. The coding sheets were sent to London and the information was entered on punched-cards, verified and processed by H. M.S.O. on the computer at Norwich. The computer programme included editing checks which threw up many errors and inconsistencies on the census schedules. These errors had to be corrected before the results could be tabulated. A critical study of the first set of tabulations showed further errors which were corrected after a visit to Gibraltar in January 1971. The time spent in correcting these errors was, as stated earlier, a cause of the delay in the publication of this report.

Some explanation is required as to why a break in tradition occurred and why the census was held in October 1970 instead of in October 1971. The answer is simple; the government needed information as soon as possible on the numbers employed and their distribution between occupations and industries. In June 1969 the border between Gibraltar and Spain had been closed and the daily flow of labour across the frontier into Gibraltar ceased. This resulted in a general shortage of manpower, but more seriously, a shortage of skilled labour. Gibraltar had to adapt itself to a new situation and it was felt imperative to know how she was doing in these adverse conditions. Tables 27, 28 and 29, show that the situation was met by the resident labour force moving into the occupations and industries where they were most needed, by an inflow of new local entrants, and by a fairly substantial influx of labour from overseas, especially from Morocco. There was no point in waiting another year for information which was needed as quickly as possible.

3. Definition of Population

Persons present in Gibraltar on census night included resident civilians, servicemen and their wives and families, visitors on holdiay (including persons on short business trips) and crews of ships and others in transit. The figure for servicemen is not available but the total of all other persons (including the wives and families of servicemen) is referred to in this report as "Persons present in Gibraltar on Census Night".

No details were collected from persons in transit, and visitors were asked to complete only the first five questions on the census form. Neither of these groups are residents but some details of visitors are shown in Tables 9 and 9A. The census, it must be remembered, was taken in October, which is not the holiday season, and in consequence the number of visitors is small. These groups are not residents of Gibraltar and make little, if any, demand on the educational, health and other services provided by government. The wives and families of servicemen are residents, though probably for periods not exceeding two years, and some details about this group are included in Tables 3 and 31 in this report. The majority of the tables, however, relate to civilian residents (excluding wives and families of servicemen) and it is convenient to refer to this civilian group as the "Population of Gibraltar". If others wish to define the population in a wider or more restricted way, they can, of course, do so.

The numbers in the various groups referred to above are given in Table 1A for the years 1951, 1961 and 1970. The 1970 figures are also repeated below

4. Nationality, Age and Sex

In a census there is not time to check the details about the nationality of every person. A person born and resident in Gibraltar was accepted as a Gibraltarian if he stated on the schedule "Gibraltarian". However, if a person was born other than in Gibraltar and said he was a Gibraltarian, it was possible to check whether this was correct or not by reference to other information on the form. Unless there was any reason for doubt, the person's nationality was accepted as that on the census schedule.

Although there are more males than females in the population (12,914 to 11,788) the number of Gibraltarian males 8,775 is less than the number of females 9,898. There are more Gibraltarian males than females in the age groups up to and including 20-24; in age group 25-29 there are more females than males; but this position is reversed with males predominant in the age group 30-34; whilst females exceed males in all age groups from age 35. As can be seen from the life-table in Appendix IX the expectation of life of a Gibraltarian female is higher than that of a Gibraltarian male. Tables 2 and 3 give details on age distribution and nationality.

5. Permanent Residents

It is difficult to say who is a permanent resident of Gibraltar and who is not. The majority of the 18,873 Gibraltarians are obviously permanent residents, though some Gibraltarians who now live abroad were present only on a temporary visit. Wives and families of servicemen are temporary residents as are many of the "British Other than Gibraltarians" and Non-British. A person who has lived in Gibraltar for several years may, however, consider himself a permanent resident even though, in law, he could be asked to leave at a moment's notice. But it is not clear where to draw the line between permanent and temporary residence using the criterion of duration of residence. No attempt is made in this report to draw such a line, but for those who wish to do so Tables 5 and 5A, giving the duration of residence of Non-Gibraltarians, may be of interest.

6. Religion

Table 7 shows the numbers by nationality in the various religious groups. Gibraltarians are almost predominantly Catholic, whereas the largest religious group in nationality "British Other than Gibraltarian" is the Church of England. Among the Non-British the Moslem religion is dominant. It is interesting to note that at the 1961 census only 6 Moslems were recorded, whereas because of the recent influx of Moroccans the figure in 1970 was 1,989. The number of Jews and Presbyterians appears to have fallen, but the remaining small religious groups have all increased.

7. Demographic Data

Tables 10 and 11 show the distribution of married, widowed and divorced females by age of mother and duration of first marriage, by number of children born alive. Tables 10A and 10B also provide additional information by level of education of the mother. These tables, with the vital statistics on births and deaths, provide the basic information for the estimation of the birth and death rates and rates of differential fertility - see Appendix IX.

8. Manpower

In this report, the occupational classification was based on the International Standard Classification of Occupations, Revised Edition 1968, published by the United Nations; and industries based on the International Standard Industrial Classification of All Economic Activities, 1968, published by the United Nations. Full descriptions of the Occupational, Industry and Industry Group classifications used are shown at Appendix V, VI and VII. These classifications differ from those of the 1961 census report which used the "Guide to Occupational Classification" of the then Ministry of Labour and National Service in the United Kingdom, and the "Standard Industrial Classification" prepared by the Central Statistical Office for use in the United Kingdom.

In themselves the differences in the classifications are not sufficient to make impossible a comparison between 1961 and 1970. The real difficulty in making any comparisons was outlined in the introduction to this report. The 1961 census figures excluded the several thousand Spanish workers who crossed the border daily to work in Gibraltar, whereas the 1970 census figures include the total labour force of Gibraltar. The 1961 figures are a substantial under-statement of the numbers in the various occupations and industries, and comparisons with the 1970 figures would be quite misleading, tending to over-state the changes which occurred between the two periods.

The 1961 census gave no breakdown of the numbers employed by nationality, and in consequence it is not even possible from the census data to say whether employment of Gibraltarians or Other British has increased between the census periods. One thing is certain, the number of Moroccans has risen phenomenally.

A glance at the list of tables will show that the manpower figures have been analysed in great detail. Occupations have been cross-classified by industry, employment status, age, and level of education and qualifications. Figures have also been provided on full-time and part-time workers and on persons with a second employment. Table 31 gives the occupation and industry of the wives and families of servicemen who were employed in Gibraltar; the numbers are small and are not included in any of the manpower tables.

Particular attention is drawn to Tables 27 and 29. These tables need to be read with care. They relate to movements between occupations and industries of persons who were in employment in May 1969 – just before the Spanish border was closed – and who were counted at the census of October 1970. These tables exclude the Spanish labourers who commuted daily across the border, but also exclude those residents in Gibraltar who were working in May 1969 but either died or left Gibraltar before the 1970 census. Given that those who died or left Gibraltar during this period were relatively small, the figures of the movements between occupations and industries, and of new entrants, local and overseas, provide useful information on how Gibraltar adapted itself to a sudden shortage of manpower. Activity rates, showing the Economically-Active as a percentage of the Population, are shown at Appendix X.

9. Educational Level and Qualifications

There are inherent difficulties in trying to group levels of education where different educational systems are involved, such as those of Gibraltar, UK, Spain, India, etc, and also due to the great changes in education over the years. But the Education Authorities were consulted in an attempt to harmonise these levels. In Table 22 "Up to Secondary Modern" education includes all primary and secondary non-grammar education and its equivalents in other countries; technical college refers only to the Gibraltar and Dockyard College; whilst the present UK technical colleges, Teacher's Training Colleges and Universities are included under "Above Grammar". Education before 1945 at the schools now known as Loreto High School and the Grammar School have been included as "Grammar" level.

Similar difficulties arise in relation to qualifications, with the added difficulty of trying to relate technical qualifications with academic ones. In Table 23, City and Guilds has been related with GCE ordinary level; Ordinary National Diploma (O.N.D.) with GCE advanced level; and Higher National Diploma (H.N.D.) with University Degree level and recognised Professional Qualifications. These, too, were decided upon after consulation with Education Authorities and Technical Personnel Managers.

10. Housing

In this census a household relates to all persons sleeping under the same roof and sharing meals. The census schedule included the following instruction:-

"If a house is let or sublet to persons or families living separately, each Occupier must make a return for his portion of the house, upon a separate schedule". Institutions such as hotels, hostels, guesthouses, old peoples' homes, hospitals, prisons, etc were excluded from the definition of households.

These questions were, perhaps, less accurately answered than the other questions on the census schedule. Many people were unable to differentiate between a house and a flat and rather than show separate but false figures for houses and flats, it was decided to combine them. Other dwellings include huts, caravans, boats, tents etc. Hotels, hostels and lodging and boarding houses were classified as institutions and are excluded from the figures in Tables 35 to 38.

The question about number of rooms raised many problems which were far from simple to answer. Whether partitioning resulted in one room becoming two or more rooms was not easy to answer and enumerators had often to refer the problem to the staff at the census office. But a solution was generally only possible after a visit to the premises and this was not always convenient. The figures in Table 36 should then be taken as orders of magnitude, rather than as accurate figures. The question on facilities raised no difficulties and the figures in Tables 37, 37A and 37B can be taken as reliable. Table 38 confirms that most people in Gibraltar park their cars on the street, and this is so whether the householder owns his own dwelling, or rents it privately or from the government.

11. Accuracy

There will always be someone who can say he was missed at the census count. It is belived that few were missed on the census night of 6 October 1970, and that the published figures in this report of the population and of those present on census night are reliable and near the true figures: the details in the various tables are obviously not as accurate as the figure of the total count. Errors occurred such as misreporting of age, wrong occupation, as well as mistakes in coding and even though every care was taken to correct them, some will no doubt be found by someone in this report. These errors should, however, in no way be taken as an indication that the report, in general, is inaccurate. It is not, and it provides reliable information.

Population and Housing Census 1970 Instructions to Enumerators

General

Personal Responsibility

(1) You have signed an agreement to act as an enumerator and your appointment as such has been approved by the Governor. You are thus now personally responsible for the proper performance of your duties as a Census enumerator in accordance with the provisions of the Census Ordinance, acting under the direction of the Census Commissioner.

Courteous and conciliatory manner essential

(2) It is important that your manner should be courteous and tactful when delivering and collecting the Householder's Schedules. When delivering the Schedules give any explanations that may be asked for and request the Occupier to ensure that the completed Schedule is ready for collection by Wednesday 7th October, 1970.

Contents of Schedules strictly confidential

(3) It is particularly important to note that the Census Ordinance forbids the disclosure or communication to any person other than the Commissioner of the contents of any Schedule, or of any statistical information acquired by you in the course of your Census duties. Any breach of this instruction is an offence under this Ordinance and renders you liable on conviction to a fine not exceeding £100 or to imprisonment not exceeding six months, or to both such fine and imprisonment.

DUTIES BEFORE TUESDAY 6TH OCTOBER

Study of Instructions, Memorandum Book and Schedules

(4) Make it your first business to read these instructions carefully in conjunction with the Memorandum Book and Schedules. A class will be held to study the instructions and examples on the Schedule, and each question on the Schedule will be examined and discussed in detail. You should then be competent to answer any questions that are put to you and to assist the householder where necessary, to complete the Schedule. At this class, or at any time, you should raise any points which are not clear to you, or draw attention if any unusual situation occurs.

(5) The Schedule must include:-

- (a) Every person present in the household on the night of 6th October, 1970 and alive at midnight.
- (b) Any person of the household who, although not in the dwelling or tenement during the Census night, but who was in Gibraltar and had not been enumerated elsewhere, (e.g. policemen, watchmen, and others on night duty on the Census night) and patients in hospitals in Gibraltar.
- (c) Members of the Gibraltar Regiment, notwithstanding that they may be resident in, or on duty on military premises and will not necessarily be at their homes on Census night.

(6) The Schedule must not include:-

- (a) Any person who had died before midnight on the Census night
- (b) Any child born after midnight on the Census night.
- (c) Any resident who was absent from Gibraltar on the Census night.
- (d) Any person who had been enumerated elsewhere.
- (e) Any serving member of the Armed Forces and their families.

ENUMERATION OF SERVING MEMBERS OF THE ARMED FORCES AND THEIR FAMILIES

(7) Serving members of the Armed Forces, and their families, whether living in service quarters or in Civilian accommodation will be enumerated under separate arrangements by the Service Departments. They should not, therefore, be served with a Schedule by the Civilian enumerators. They will, however,

receive a Schedule from the enumerator for completion only in respect of any guest, relative or resident domestic servant residing in the household on Census night.

To avoid duplication enumerators will be given a list of Service Families living in civilian accommodation within their respective districts to whom they need not serve Schedules.

Members of the Gibraltar Regiment and their families are NOT included in this arrangement, and should be dealt with as ordinary civilians (see paragraph 5 (c)).

ENUMERATION OF U.K. BASED CIVILIAN EMPLOYEES OF THE SERVICE: DEPARTMENTS

(8) The arrangements as set out in paragraph 7 does not apply to U.K. based civilian employees of the Service Departments. Such civilians and their families will be dealt with as ordinary civilians.

BOUNDARIES AND CONTENTS OF YOUR ENUMERATION DISTRICT

(9) Acquaint yourself with the boundaries and contents of your district and make certain that you know exactly the area for which you are responsible. If you are in any doubt as to the precise boundaries of the district allocated to you, you should consult the Commissioner without delay.

You need NOT deliver Schedules to any dwelling which you know is a Service quarter, unless the Census Commissioner has specifically instructed you to do so.

THE DELIVERY OF SCHEDULES

- (10) Take particular care to arrange a convenient route by which you can visit every dwelling and enumerate every person within your district and be certain that no occupied premises are omitted.
- (11) The number of your district and the serial or household number must be inserted on the front of each Schedule. Before delivering a Schedule write on it, in the space provided, the name and address of the Head of the family or occupier. Enter in the first column of your Memorandum Book the number of the Schedule (if a household requires more than one Schedule enter the same household number on each Schedule but note in your Memorandum Book that you have left two or more Schedules) and complete the remaining columns of the Memorandum Book as may be appropriate.

Enter in the remarks column of your Memorandum Book the number of Moroccans in a household. This information is required because an interpreter may have to be called for.

PERSONS WHO ARE TO RECEIVE SCHEDULES

- (12) (a) Every head of a household occupying the whole, or separately occupying part of a house or flat.
 - (b) Every separate lodger occupying a room or rooms in a house or flat NOT BOARDING with a family in the house. (Not boarding should be interpreted as not sharing meals with the occupier or his family.)
 - (c) Every outdoor servant (with or without family) occupying separately any building, such as a lodge, Gardener's Cottage, etc., which is detached from the house to which it belongs or has no internal communication therewith.
 - (d) Every proprietor, Manager, or Head of any Hotel, Club, Business Establishment, School etc., unless the Commissioner has notified you otherwise.
 - (e) The Head of every Institution (such as Hospital, Prison, etc.,) unless the Commissioner has notified you otherwise.

THE COLLECTION OF SCHEDULES

(13) The collection of Schedules MUST begin on Wednesday 7th October 1970, and be completed by Friday, 9th October, 1970.

ENTRIES IN THE MEMORANDUM BOOK AT TIME OF COLLECTION

(14) You must collect every Schedule that you have delivered and show that you have done so by inserting a tick in the appropriate column of your Memorandum Book. Thus for instance, if the occupier has left the premises, you must strike out the name and insert in the column the reason, e.g. "Family removed" "Family on Holiday", etc.

SCHEDULES LOST OR OMITTED TO BE SUPPLIED

(15) Should you find that an occupier has not received a Schedule or that the Schedule delivered has been lost or mislaid you must supply one from your reserve stock and request the occupier or person in charge of the premises to fill it up. If necessary you must enter the particulars yourself. If the schedule is a duplicate to replace a lost schedule, then enter the household number of the original schedule on the duplicate and write in the remarks column of your Memorandum Book 'Duplicate'. If the occupier has not received a schedule enter the next unallocated household number of the schedule you issue to him and write 'Omitted' in the remarks column of your Memorandum Book.

EXAMINATION OF SCHEDULES

(16) On collecting a Schedule examine it carefully in order to satisfy yourself that it has been correctly and completely filled up.

INCOMPLETE OR INACCURATE INFORMATION

(17) If the Schedule is incomplete, inaccurate or illegible, you must ask any question necessary to enable you to complete or correct it. When making corrections a line should be drawn through the erroneous entry and the corrections written legibly and initialled. No erasures should be made.

Every effort must be made to obtain full particulars but if full particulars cannot be obtained concerning any person, such persons must not on that account be omitted from the Schedule, but the letters "N.K." (not Known) must be entered in the column or columns for which the information is not obtainable.

REFUSAL TO FILL UP THE SCHEDULE

(18) Should anyone refuse to fill up the Schedule or answer the questions which your are authorised to put, draw the attention of any such persons to the instructions to the Occupier contained on the front of the Schedule, with particular reference to the fact that refusal to give such information renders them liable to a fine of fifty pounds. Should the person still refuse to give information, do not engage in any dispute, but write in your Memorandum Book "Information Refused" and report the matter as early as possible to the Commissioner.

DUTIES AFTER ENUMERATION

- (19) After having collected all the Schedules in your district you must as soon as possible, but in no case later than Saturday 10th October deliver personally to the Commissioner:-
 - (a) All the Schedules collected by you.
 - (b) All unused Schedules
 - (c) Your Memorandum Book
 - (d) The completed "Statement of Schedules and Certificate".

All completed Schedules must be unfolded and arranged in strict numerical order, and it is important that the "Statement of Schedules Supplied, Distributed and Collected" be correctly completed and a satisfactory account rendered of all Schedules issued.

CENSUS OF GIBRALTAR, 1970

NOTICE TO HOUSEHOLDERS CONCERNING THE CENSUS TO BE TAKEN ON TUESDAY, 6th OCTOBER, 1970

As you are probably aware, a Census of the population of Gibraltar is to be held on the night of TUESDAY, the 6th OCTOBER, 1970 and the object of this notice is to seek your co-operation.

- 2. The Census has always provided necessary statistical data. This year's Census will be particularly valuable as it presents the first opportunity, since the withdrawal of the Spanish Labour force, to obtain accurate figures of Gibraltar's present and potential labour resources. This is one of the reasons why the information asked for in the Schedule is far more comprehensive than on previous occasions.
- 3. To enable the Census to be taken, a form entitled 'Householder's Schedule' will shortly be delivered to every householder in Gibraltar. That form should be completed in accordance with the directions it contains, in respect of every person residing in each dwelling on the night of the 6th October.
- 4. The Schedule is not applicable to householders who are serving members of the Armed Forces, their wives and children. They will be receiving instructions on the subject direct through Service channels. It will, however, apply to resident domestic servants, and guests who are not visitors on holiday or a short business trip from overseas. In their case, arrangements will be made to see they receive a schedule.
- 5. Householders who are United Kingdom-based civilian employees of any of the United Kingdom Government Ministries will be required to complete the Schedule in the usual way.
- 6. Householders who have any member of their family serving in the Gibraltar Regiment on the 6th October, 1970, should include such member in their Schedule as if he were resident with them.
- 7. I need hardly stress how important it is that the Schedule should be completed accurately and legibly. Your co-operation in this matter is, therefore, earnestly requested and I would ask all householders to read the directions and examples given on the Schedule carefully before it is completed.
- 8. Enumerators will ensure as far as possible that every householder receives a Schedule on or before the 3rd October, 1970, but if by the evening of that date a householder has not received a Schedule he should notify the Census Office at Montagu Bastion, Line Wall Road Tel. (A. 4891) before the 6th October.
- 9. The Enumerator appointed for each district will call for the completed Householders' Schedules between 7th and 10th October, and will assist if any difficulty has been encountered in completing the form.

NOTES

ON COMPLETING THE CENSUS QUESTIONAIRE

- 1. All persons present in the Household during the night of the Census should be entered on the Schedule. Exclude persons who are absent, except those at work during Census Night.
- 2. Visitors should be included, but only Questions 1-5 inclusive need be answered for visitors from outside Gibraltar.
- 3. Men serving with the Gibraltar Regiment should be included.
- 4. The small numbered boxes are for the purposes of processing the Cenaus information, and should be left blank.
- 5. The Questionnaire is divided into 4 main parts: -
 - PART A (page 2) asks personal details and is to be completed for all persons in the Household.
 - PART B (page 2) asks details of women who are married, widowed or divorced.
 - PART C (pages 4 & 5) asks employment details and is to be completed for persons aged 15 and over only.
 - PART D (page 6) asks general household details and is to be completed by the Head of the Household.
- 6. Relationship to Head of Household (Question 3) any relative present in the household who usually lives elsewhere should be shown as a visitor.
- 7. Occupation and Industry (Questions 17 and 19)
 - The OCCUPATION should be stated as fully as possible avoiding the use of general or vague terms (some examples are given below).
 - The NAME AND ADDRESS OF EMPLOYER or business is required solely to identify the business or industry.
 - DESCRIPTION OF BUSINESS should give details of the main goods or services provided.
 - EMPLOYMENT STATUS—paid or unpaid workers in a family business should be entered as "employees".
- 8. EMPLOYMENT DURING MAY 1969 (Question 19) refers to the month immediately before the closing of the land frontier with Spain.
- 9. EDUCATION AND QUALIFICATION (Question 21 & 22)—only the highest level of schooling and qualification should be stated, but if uncertain which of two schools or qualifications is the higher, state both.
- 10. QUALIFICATIONS (Question 22) Use recognised abbreviations where appropriate e.g. Ph.D (History); A.M.I.C.E. (Civil Engineering) Dip. Tech. (Elc. Engineering): Otherwise write the name of the qualification in full.
- 11. NUMBER OF VISITORS (Question 27) Include all Resident Guests whether residents of Gibraltar or residents from outside Gibraltar.
- 12. NUMBER OF ROOMS (Question 28) Should exclude all kitchens, bathrooms, and hallways (but include any balconies converted into alceping or living quarters).
- 13. The example of the census questionnaire on page 8 may assist you in completing this questionnaire.

5 The crude birth rate figures were estimated from the unpublished data on civilian births provided by Mr. A. Rooke, government statistician in Gibraltar at the time of the census. It was not possible to divide deaths into civilians and services, but it is believed that deaths in the latter were relatively small. The crude death rates are based on the assumption that all the deaths were civilian deaths.

7 To derive the above figures it was assumed that all births at the St. Bernards Hospital and at home were civilian births, and all births at the Royal Naval Hospital were births to the wives of servicemen. It is known that some of the births at the latter hospital were births to UK citizens with the Department of Environment and HM Dockyard. Thus the above figures under-estimate civilian births. A test of the possible degree of under-enumeration of births was undertaken using the data given above, the census data in Table 10, and the techniques described in "Methods of Estimating Basic Demographic Measures from Incomplete Data" published by the United Nations. The test did not support the hypothesis of under-estimation, which implied that the omitted births were few in number, and in consequence the age specific fertility rates given above are accepted as the best at present available.

8 The estimates of life expectancy were calculated from data given in Table 10 on numbers of children born and numbers surviving. The method is fully described in the United Nations publication referred to earlier, and for those technically minded, the details of the calculations are set out below.

⁹ The above calculations suggest that the life expectancy of females at birth lies between 71·1 and 74·5 years, with an average figure of 72·5 years, and for males the figures are 69·4 to 72·5 with an average of 70·7 years.

10 The model life tables in the UN publication, referred to previously, give the age specific death rates associated with various expectations of life at birth. If the female death rates appropriate to a female expectation of life at birth of 72.5 years (Level 22 in the tables) are applied to the census data showing the number of females by age groups then the estimated number of female deaths is 124. This is slightly higher than the actual number of deaths of 117 – the average for the years 1968 and 1969. A life table for females with an expectation of life of 72.5 years at birth was considered to reasonably reflect the mortality of the female population of Gibraltar at the time of the census, though on the evidence some demographers may have put the figure slightly higher.

11 Similar calculations for males using a model life table with an expectation of life at birth of 70·7 years — the average referred to in paragraph 9 — produced an estimated figure of deaths well below the actual number recorded. A life expectancy of 71·7 years thus appeared to be too high. In Western experience the life expectancy of males at birth is generally 4 or 5 years below that for females. An arbitrary life expectancy for males of 68·5 years was chosen (again Level 22, but for males) and the appropriate death rates applied to the male census population. Again the estimated number of deaths was too low, 106 as compared with the actual figure of 115, (but see comments in paragraph 13), and this suggested the life expectancy might be reduced; but to have done so would have taken it further below the minimum life expectancy of 69·4 years given in the calculation in paragraph 8. In consequence a life expectancy at birth of 68·6 years considered reasonable.

12 In paragraph 7 attention was drawn to the possible under-enumeration of civilian births. Although the test suggested that the omission of civilian birth was nil or few in number, the age specific fertility rates are so low as to suggest that omissions may have occurred. The test, in fact, may have been inadequate, and it is therefore strongly recommended that births registered in Gibraltar should be recorded as civilian or services. In other words it must not be assumed that all births which occur in the Royal Naval Hospital are services births. It will also be preferable if the civilian births are classified as Gibraltarians, British Other than Gibraltarians and Non-British – the classification used in this report.

13 The figures of deaths shown in paragraph 5 are known to include some servicemen and infants of servicemen, and may also include persons who died at sea but whose deaths were registered in Gibraltar. As this results in an inflated figure for deaths, it is important that deaths should be recorded separately for civilians – but distinguishing those who died at sea – and servicemen and their families. Again it would be useful if the civilian deaths were classified by nationality as recommended for births.
