1: INTRODUCTION

1.1 Purpose of the Tourist Survey

Following the Gibraltar Government's decision to undertake a continuous programme of interviews of visitors to Gibraltar, the Statistics Office conducted a Tourist Survey between the 1st June 194 and the 31st May 1975.

In addition to providing information necessar; for tourist marketing policies, such a survey is also useful in assisting the compilation of more accurate National Accounts. The results of the survey enable Government to monitor the development of tourism in Gibraltar.

1.2 Methodology

(a) Sampling method

The 1974-75 Tourist Survey was run on the lines of previous surveys, except for a more rigorous sampling design and a few alterations to the questionnaire.

A system of quota sampling was used, which precludes the estimation of sampling errors.

A sample size of around 1,800 interviews was aimed at in order to secure sufficient accuracy from results among the sub-samples.

Unlike previous surveys, no interviews were conducted for "visitor on yachts" since more accurate, albeit limited, data had been obtained from records at the Port Department; at the same time certain administrative and interviewing problems were avoided.

The sampling unit was the <u>party</u> of one or more persons travelling together and visiting Gibraltar for business or holiday.

A total of 1,831 interviews were satisfactorily completed, divided as follows:-

Eoth the sampling method and the sampling frame used differed from that recommended by P.A. Management Consultants for the following reasons:-

- (i) The "population" to be sampled was the total number of parties of visitors to Gibraltar. P.A. used the total number of visitors to Gibraltar as the basis for their recommended sample, thus invalidating their sampling fraction's.
- Mons Calpe sailing etc. Throughout the survey period, all "departures" were suitably covered. In this way, the survey was administered more smoothly and at a lower cost.

(b) Timing

The survey was conducted between the 1st June 1974 and the 31st May 1975. It took account of the seasonality of the holiday arrangements made by the different sampling units.

Visitors were interviewed at the following points of departure:-

- Gibraltar airport (U.K. and Morocco flights)
- North and South Moles (Cruise Ships)
- Waterport Wharf (Gibraltar Tangier ferry)

1.3 Operations

(a) Questionnaire design

The questionnaire was based on that originally used by P.A. Management Consultants for their previous Tourist Surveys in Gibraltar. However, the format of the questionnaire was amended and two more questions included. Since the use of one standard questionnaire wincluded questions inapplicable to visitors at one or other of the three different interviewing points, three slightly different acts of questionnaires were used in order to facilitate interviewing.

A copy of the more comprehensive questionniare (i.e. relating to departing visitors on flights to the U.K.) is attached at Appendix C.

() Data collection

The questionniares were completed by interviewers from the oral replies of voluntary respondents.

(c) Interviewer selection and training

Intervieus were conducted by two members of the Statistics office staff who were suitably briefed prior to commencing the survey, by the Government Statistician.

(1) Data processing

The questionnaires were processed manually at the Statistics office on a running monthly basis

1.4 Cost

The cost of the survey in terms of payments made to interviewers was just over £315, and was met out of Tourist office funds for local research.

2. SUPMARY OF FINDINGS

- 2.1 It is estimated that tourist expenditure in Gibraltar was £3.52 million during 1974 compared to £3.05 million for 1973, an increase of 15.5%. This represents a drop in real expenditure. Visitors styaing in hotels spent £2.5 million in 1974 (see Appendix A).
- 2.2 Most visitors to Gibraltar came from the U.K. particularily from London and the South East.
- 2.3 A steadily increasing proportion of visitors from U.K. are making repeat visits to Gibraltar.
- 2.4 It was largely personal recommendations and advetising which influenced holidaymakers to visit Gibraltar for the first time. Gibraltar's sunshine was the most important factor which attracted visitors.
- 2.5 Visitors to Gibraltar were mostly over 35 years of age. Many visitors were pleased with their stay, with more than half the total stating they intended to return.
- 2.6 Visitors to Gibraltar are spending less and staying for slightly shorter periods than in past years. At the same time there has been a steady increase in the total number of visitor arrivals. Tourist expenditure, however, dropped in real terms between 1973 and 1974.

The success of tourist policies can be measured by a combination of these factors. The experience of 1974 suggests that an increase in the total number of visitor arrivals is not necessarily the most important consideration.

. PROWILE OF VISITORS TO GIBRALTAR

The results of the 1974-75 Tourist Survey provide a useful picture of the type of visitors attracted to Gibrultar. Detailed tables are attached at Alpendix C.

The following analysis summarises the more important findings and, in particular draws comparisons with results obtained from past surveys.

3.1 Country of residence (see Table 1)

The vast majority of visitors to Gibraltar arriving by air from U.K. are residents of U.K./Eire. Most cruise ship excursionists were also U.K. residents (6%), although the proportion has dropped in comparison to previous years (88% in 1971, 85% in 1972/73). More Americans called in on cruises (up from 4, in 1972/73 to 26% in 1974/75.)

Visitors from Morocco were mainly Moroccan residents (55%) although U.K./Eire residents accounted for 24% of the total, practically the opposite of the case during 1972/73. (It should be borne in mind that there was a drop of nearly 6,000 visitors from Morocco between 1973 and 1974).

3.2 Area of Residence (see Table 2)

As in past years, the highest proportion of British visitors to Gibraltar came from London and the South East, although a relatively higher percentage of visitors came from the Midlands, the North West and the South West. The pattern is practically identical throughout the seasons, and is quite similar for U.K. arrivals from Morocc.

3.3 Type and size of party (see Table 3)

The average size of parties of holidaymakers from T.K. was 2.6 persons (2.3 in 1972/73). Only % of those on an inclusive tour travelled alone whilst almost a quarter travelling independently did so alone.

Compared to 1972-73, a relatively higher percentage of visitors, for every category of visitor, travelled with "friends" during 1974-75, whilst the corresponding figures for those travelling with "family"fell.

51% of inclusive holidaymakers travelled in parties of three or here (24 in 1972/73). These relatively larger parties were more common in summer.

3.4 Children in the party (seeTable 4)

in past years, just over 10% of British visitors to Gibraltar have children with them. This pattern, with the obvious exception of businessmen, is practically identical for all categories of visitors.

7.7 Purpose of visit

65% of visitors arriving by air from U.K. came to Gibraltar on holiday (50%) on an inclusive tour), 19% on business, and 16% were visiting family and friends.

Only 15% of arrivals from Morocco came to Gibraltar for shopping; (25% in 1972/73) the remainder were either on a short holiday, on a day excursion or business.

3.6 Previous visits to Gibraltar (See Table 5)

A rather higher propertion of visitors from the U.K. were making repeat visits to Gibraltar than in past years (26% in 1970/71, 28% in 1972/73, 33% in 1974/75). This increase is reflected in the number of repeat visits by "inclusives" (up from 23% to 29% and by "independents" (up from 31% to 36%). Not surprisingly repeat visits compared to 44% in 1974/75.

3.7 Location of previous holidays (See table 6)

Of holidaynakers arriving from the U.K., 22% had spent their holihys in the previous three years in the U.K. 14% had spent at least one holiday outside U.K. but in the European Sterling Area.

3.8 Reason for choosing Gibraltar (see Table 7)

Personal recommendation has proved to be a growing influential factor in attracting visitors to Gibraltar (up from 23% to 35% over the past year).

Advertising has been slightly more effective (up from 17% in 1972/73 to 25% in 1973/74), particularly for visitors on a summer inclusive tour (45%).

3.9 Reason for coming to Gibraltar (see Table 8)

Gibraltar's sunshine continues to be the most important reason, particularily amongst British holidaymkers on an inclusive tour. It was also a growing consideration for those making independent holiday arrangements (up from 45% in 1972/73 to 59% in 1974/75). British language (26%) and British currency (23%) continued to be important reasons why people on holiday visit Gibraltar.

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2.10 Length of Stay (see Table 9)

The average length of stay of visitors from the U.K. is 8 days. For inclusives, average length of stay was 8 days compered to 10 days druing 1972/73, reflecting the drop during the winter and shoulder months.

Visitors from Morocco tended to stay slightly longer.

3.11 coomodation used (see table 10)

94% of holidaymakers from U.K. stayed in hotels featured by tour operators (85% in 1972/73). Over half the number of holidaymakers stayed in beach hotels

Nearly two-thirds of holidaymakers on an inclusive tour stayed in beach hotels; In winter, the proportion was 71%.

Holidaymakers making independent arrangements were still more inclined to stay in town hotels.

3.12 Type of holiday arrangement (see table 12)

During 1974-75, 77% of British holidaymakers to Gibraltar were on an inclusive tour (63, in 1972/73).

Bland/Cadogan continued to gain business (up from 24% in 1972/73 to 33% in 1974/75) whilst Exchange Travel suffered a large drop (from 50% in 1972/73 to 23% in 1974/75). Sovereign/Silver Wing took a substantial share (26%)

3.13 Expenditure patterns (see tables 13, 14)

and 1974/75 for visitor arrivals from UK with the exception of businessmen. There was a slight increase in expenditure for visitors from Morocco and amongst cruise ship excursionists. However, there was no real increase in expenditure by the various categories of visitor, other than by visitors from Morocco who came to Gibraltar for shopping (however the numbers involved have dropped by around 50, between 1973 and 1974).

British holidaymakers spent an average of $\mathbb{S}4.8$ per person per day ($\mathbb{S}5.2$ in 1972/73), excluding hotel and travel costs. Businessmen spent $\mathbb{S}7.5$ per person per day ($\mathbb{S}6.8$ in 1972/73) whilst those staying with family or friend spent $\mathbb{S}3.2$ ($\mathbb{S}4.7$ in 1972/73).

Vasitors arriving by air from U.K. Spent an average of £3.6 per person per night on their/(£2.5 in 1972/73). Overall, Expenditure on Hotels seems to have kept in line with inflation.

Tourist expenditure for 1974 is estimated at £3.52 million (see Appendix I).

3.14 Opinion of Gibraltar (see table 11)

For practically every category of visitor, slightly more than 60% stated they would return to Gibraltar. Most visitors continued to be very pleased with their stay.

Various complaints and suggestions were noted and a summary of these is attached at Appendix $B_{\scriptstyle ullet}$

3.15 Age group of head of party (see table 15)

Most visitors to Gibraltar were over 35 years of age. A fairly large percentage of visitors were over 55, particularily amongst cruise ship excursionists.

APPENDIX A: CALCULATION OF TOURIST EXPENDITURE

Different estimates of tourist expenditure have been calculated by P.A.

Management Consultants and by the Government Statistician over the past few years.

The differences lie in the methodology and definitions used. This year a more rigid and clearly defined method has been used to calculate expenditure, which as basically a refinement of past estimates by this office.

It is important to use a correct definition of "tourist" as well as of "visitor" before proceeding with any calculations. According to IUOTO, the term "visitor" describes "any person visiting a country other than in which he has his usual place of residence, for any reason other than following an occupation remunerated from within the country visited". This definition covers two classes of "visitor" - "tourists" and "excursionists" which are defined as follows:

"tourists" i.e. temporary visitors staying at least twenty-four hours in the country visited and the purpose of whose journey can be classified as leaisure, business, family, mission, meeting.

"excursionists" i.e. temporary visitors staying less than twenty-four hours in the country visited (including travellers on cruises).

However, for the purpose of estimating tourist receipts, expenditures by excyrsionists is included.

To estimate tourist expenditure in Gibraltar visitors are separated into six broad categories, each with different expenditure patterms and length of stay i.e.

- (i) Arrivals at hotels.
- (ii) Visitors in supplementary accomodation
- (iii) Visitors on yachts.

 Excursionists from Morocco.
 - (v) Excursionists from cruises.
 - (vi) In transit visitors.

(i) Arrivals at hotels.

Expenditure is based on all arrivals at hotels, excluding residents in long-lets, and not just tourist arrivals, since visitors other than tourists are included in attinguing expenditure.

At total of 39,758 visitors spent 271,225 guest-nights in Gibraltar during 1970.

An astimate of the division of these arrivals can be based on the figures for staying visitors recorded by the Immigration Office - a total of 46,008 of which 54,523 (75%) came by air from U,K., 11,395 (25%) from Morocco. Applying these proportions to arrivals in hotels we calculate.

- 29,819 from U.K.
- 9,939 from Morocoo 39,758

77% of visitor arrivals from the U.K. were on an inclusive tour while 23% made independent arrangements (see table 12). Applying these proportions to arrivals in hotels from U.K. we have.

- 22,961 (inclusives)
- 6,858 (independents)

The validity of this method to calculate the division of arrivals in hotels is confirmed by applying the average length of stay figures from each of the three categories to calculate numbers of arrivals in each category.

(iii) Visitors on Yachts

Out of a total of 1,979 yacht arrivals, 1,620 arrivals are estimated to have been non-local yacht arrivals (source: Port Department).

The average number of persons per yacht was 4.1 persons, and the average length of stay was 5 days (source: Port Department).

Average expenditure per person per yacht is estimated at £6.7, so that expenditure is calculated as:-

(iv) Excursionists from Morocco

There were a total of 14,705 excursionists from Morocco in 1974 (3,343 arrived by air, 11,362 by sea).

In addition, there were 11,395 visitors from Morocco who were not excursionists. Thus, the total number of visitors from Morocco during 1974 was 26,100. 15% of those visitors came to Gibraltar on a shopping excursion i.o. 5,915 visitors.

Of the remaining 22,185 visitors, 11,395 visitors were staying visitors, so that

(v) Excursionists from cruises

There were 60,793 cruise ship excursionists to Gibraltar during 1974 each spending on average £6.5, giving a total expenditure of £395,155.

(vi) In-transit visitors

There are two types of in-transit visitors

- air passengers from U.K. to Morocco
- sea passengers from the Mons Calpe going on by air to U.K.

Air Passengers (9,390 in 1974) may or may not have the opportunity of leaving the aircraft and spend money in Gibraltar. It is practically impossible to work out a reliable estimate of expenditure, although a cautious estimate would be £2.2.

The 398 in-transit passengers from the Mons Calpe have more time and opportunity/
to spend money in Gibraltar and expenditure per person is estimated at 65.5.

Total expenditure for in-transit visitors is therefore around £23,000.

Total Tourist Expenditure for 1974 is therefore estimated as £3.5 million, broken down as follows:-

The following refinements have been introduced into the following methodology for calculating tourist expenditure.

- (1) By definition, all visitor arrivals at hotels excluding long-term residents is used and not just "tourist arrivals".
- (2) Average Length of stay for visitors from Morocco staying in Gibraltar is adjusted to make allowance for day visitors.
- (3) The number of visitors staying in supplementary accommodation is taken to be the difference between all staying visitors/in hotels in Gibraltar and not the annual figure given by the Immigration Office as "persons in supplementary Accommodation".
- (4) Visitors in supplementary accommodation are now divided into those who arrived by air from U.K. and those who arrived from Morocco.
- (5) The no. of non-local yacht arrivals and not the total no. of yachts arrivals is taken.
- (6) Excursionists from Morocco are divided into "shopping" and "non-shopping" categories, otherwise expenditure is overestimated.

The revised estinate for Tourist Expenditure in 1973 is £3 million. This increase in expenditure between 1973 and 1974 was 15.5%, representing a fall in real expenditure. The following table summarises the calculation of expenditure for 1973 and 1974:-

APPENDIX B: SUMMARY OF COMPLAINTS AND SUGGESTIONS FROM VISITORS INTERVIEWED BETWEEN

1. HOTELS

A total of nearly 90 complaints were made by departing visitors about hotels in Gibraltar. Most complained about the standard of food and service, as well as the lack of cleanliness.

ALTERTATIMENT AND TOURIST ATTRACTIONS

Nearly 60 complaints referred to the "lack of night life" or the "lack of things to do".

Several visitors suggested that there should be more signposts up the Rock, particularly on tourist sites.

3. PRICES AND SHOPPING

About 80 complained related to "high prices". Many complainted about the lack of quality goods, a feeling which some summarised as "too much oriental rubbish", "not enough variety" or as one put it "not a good selection of beer".

4. SERVICES

There were around 20 complaints about buses being slow, and taxi-drivers overcharging.

Some visitors wanted to see an improved system of luggage collection at the airport, with porters etc.

There were around 10 complaints about the lack of information and about misleading information. Some tourists felt there was insufficient information about duty-free shopping.

The "Tangier tour" was described as "terrible" and "a waste of time" by a few.

5. GENERAL

There were several suggestion regarding facilities in general, like the need, for more notices of historical interest for "proper fishing facilities" for indeed sporting facilities like bowling etc.

There were many complaints about traffic noise and about the lack of pedestrianisation.
