Cathedral of St Mary the Crowned

The present Catholic Cathedral built in the Gothic style in the reign of Queen Isabella of Castille in 1502 was originally the main mosque in the Middle Ages. Its acoustics are perfect for concerts, chamber music ensembles and choirs.

Convent Ballroom

Originally part of a Franciscan Friary and Church completed in 1531, the Convent is the official residence of the Governor of Gibraltar. The stately ballroom dating from the reign of Queen Victoria and which has seating for 155 persons, is the perfect setting for many concerts. Grand Casemates Square

One of the oldest squares in Gibraltar, dating back to 1160 and still used as a parade ground. It has served as a traditional venue for the Ceremony of the Keys and many other events.
