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Students Stand Against Domestic Violence

Today is the International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women. In a poignant mark of solidarity, Bayside students and members of the Staff and Student Council locked arms to form a human chain around Bayside school to signify their stand against domestic violence in all its forms.

Staff and students dressed in white as a symbolic gesture and wore white ribbons – sold by students at a stand they organized. The White Ribbon Campaign (WRC) is a global movement of men and boys working to end male violence against women and girls.

Students from Bayside school and the Gibraltar College demonstrated their awareness and understanding of domestic violence issues through a poetry and short story competition. Winners were announced during an assembly at Bayside school this morning, and prizes and certificates of participation were presented by Minister for Equality, the Hon Samantha Sacramento. Minister for Education, the Hon Dr John Cortes also addressed the students, praising them for their sensitive submissions and expressing his enthusiasm for working together with staff and students to tackle domestic violence.

Minster for Equality, the Hon Samantha Sacramento, thanked the students sincerely for their wholehearted participation in this emotive event. Although this is the International Day for the Elimination of Domestic Violence against Women, men can also be victims of domestic violence. Note to Editors

The International Day for the Elimination of Violence against Women is a global Human Rights initiative intended to raise public awareness and mobilize people everywhere to bring about change and eliminate domestic violence. Designed to remove persisting inequalities between men and women this campaign relies on men and boys to be the voice of change by making a personal pledge to SAY NO to domestic violence and sexual assault.

While of course not all victims of domestic abuse are women and not all perpetrators are men, studies shows that this is currently the predominant situation.

Acknowledging that not all men are violent, the current campaign asks men not to ignore the problem but to pledge never to commit, condone or remain silent about men's violence against women.
